Kyriakos Forakis holds, since 2004, an academic post of Specialised Teaching Staff in the field of "Theoretical and applied teaching of the French language" at the Department of French Language and Literature of the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens. He accomplished his higher education at the University of Paris-Sorbonne (Paris IV) where he received his PhD in French linguistics, in 2001. After having practised teaching and assessment at the French Institute of Athens, he has been elected at the department where he currently teaches French language and linguistics. French grammar and stylistics, history of the French language and study of interlanguage are included amongst his principal disciplines while his research works cover the following areas of Language Sciences:

- Study of modern French in its diversity from a morphosyntactic and occasionally stylistic perspective.
- Diachronic approaches in French linguistics:
 - o grammaticalization, morphosyntax and pragmatics in classical and postclassical French (negative markers, personal pronouns, etc.);
 - grammatical reflection during the 17th century (Grammars/Remarks, Port-Royal).
- Sociolinguistic issues:
 - variation and grammar;
 - reception and conceptualization of the norm in classical, modern and contemporary French.
- Contrastive linguistic issues (French/Greek).
- Study of interlanguage and of the development of linguistic and metalinguistic competences among Greek-speaking users of French.
